• PRE-CATECHUMENATE & EVANGELIZATION

- Storytellers
 - × "They know the great stories of scripture and can relate those stories to their own lives and the lives of others."

• Active Listeners

- * "They need to know how to listen to the cues that signal opportunities of the "a-ha" moments.
- Have led faith-sharing groups
- Proficient with the dynamics of Christian witness
- Paragraph 42 etched in their minds
 - \times and lead the inquirers more deeply into conversion
- Have a willingness to enter into an honest, discerning dialogue

• CATECHUMENATE

- o Catechesists, Parishioners, Sponsors, Director, Priest, Deacon
- Active, believing member of the Christian community
 - * and they truly believe that the community is the one that forms and initiates
- Knows the parish well and can invite them into the process
 - × asking the faithful to companion or come share stories
- Understands that the life of the community is grounded in the liturgy
- Skilled in asking questions that challenge attitudes and ways of looking at behavior in the world

• CATECHUMENATE

- Knows how to ask the "so what" questions
- Understands that the Christian life is apostolic
- They may have certain areas that interest them
 - × Use the expertise of the team members
- Flexible, Dedicated, Communicative, Engaging, Creative
- Can work to make Paragraph 75 (!!!) a reality in the parish

• PURIFICATION & ENLIGHTENMENT

• Able to lead spiritual preparation

• Facilitate the lenten baptismal and penitential preparation of the elect

• MYSTAGOGY

- "Those who are at home in the world of symbols."
 - * "Teachers are not always good mystagogues. Poets and artists, however, might make wonderful catechists."
- Able to invite the neophyte to embrace the mystery with renewed insight
- Has lived the paschal mystery themselves
 - * has the wisdom to invite others into the ongoing mystery of Christ's death and resurrection
- Able to allow the neophytes to discover for themselves...
 - × what they experienced
 - × how to weave that experience into their lives

Lectionary as Primary Text

FIRST READING - 5th Sunday in Easter (Year A) Acts 6:1-7

- As the number of disciples continued to grow, the Hellenists complained against the Hebrews because their widows were being neglected in the daily distribution.
- So the Twelve called together the community of the disciples and said,
- "It is not right for us to neglect the word of God to serve at table. Brothers, select from among you seven reputable men, filled with the Spirit and wisdom, whom we shall appoint to this task, whereas we shall devote ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word."
- The proposal was acceptable to the whole community, so they chose Stephen, a man filled with faith and the Holy Spirit, also Philip, Prochorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas, and Nicholas of Antioch, a convert to Judaism.
- They presented these men to the apostles who praved and laid hands on them.
- The word of God continued to spread, and the number of the disciples in Jerusalem increased greatly; even a large group of priests were becoming obedient to the faith.



Vestments are the special garments worn by ministers at the celebration of liturgy. They originated in the time of the late Roman Empire. The ordinary clothing for men at this time was a long tunic tied at the waist (the origin of the presentday alb and cincture) and a large serape-like over-garment (the origin of the present-day chasuble). While everyday garments changed after the fall of the Empire, clergy continued to use these styles in the celebration of liturgyhence, they took on symbolic meaning. Priests wear the alb, chasuble, and stole (a narrow band of cloth worn across the back of the neck and hanging down the front, as did Roman judges and other officials as a sign of their office). Bishops also wear the same vestments but with the addition of a mitre (a pointed hat, to symbolize their office of ruling, like a crown). Deacons wear albs, dalmatics (similar to a chasuble but closed on the sides), and stoles worn over only one shoulder (ModCathE 898). Laypersons who minister at liturgy sometimes wear an alb, the white garment which symbolizes baptism.

Skills that Work & The Role of the Community PARAGRAPH 75 Word Liturgy Community **Apostolic Witness / Service**

SHAPING A CATECHUMENAL SESSION

Prepared by Clare Colella

- 1. Discern and plan:
 - a. At what point are participants in their formation?
 - b. What particular needs and questions have been arising from participants? What understandings do they have? What needs to be deepened, explained, clarified?
- 2. What is the Lectionary saying at this time this week, these few weeks? How are participants learning to listen to and learn from the Sunday liturgies?
- Lectionary-based doctrinal elements Catholic teaching, practice, Catholic culture
 - Discern the primary focus of this particular session: prayer, liturgy, community, catechesis, apostolic work
 - b. Vary style of session accordingly
- 4. Study and gather resources including facilitators/presenters
 - a. Be sure participants have /receive resources for themselves as well
 - b. Have available additional resources for those who may seek more

- Plan the flow and sequence of the session utilizing good adult catechetical methodology
- Incorporate prayer, ritual, and alternative experiences as integral and appropriate
- Look to life and lived faith help participants know how to link life, faith and formation
- 8. Build in time for questions, sharing, journaling on occasion
- Take time to evaluate both the participants and the session and make notes to help with successive sessions.
- The length of time spent on topics/experiences will vary depending on the needs of participants.
- Be aware of the different learning/formation styles of participants respond to what works for them.
- Consider the overall formation process, and what needs to be done to help the participants grow as disciples and apprentices in faith.
- > Be attentive to your own growth and creativity as ministers and fellow pilgrims.

Cautions

- Beware of programmatic approach, reliance on pre-packaged program of material
- Beware of **fundamentalism** or a **too-casual attitude**
- Note absenteeism
- Note other **needs or life events of participants**, especially annulments, other canonical and life issues
- Plan for on-going process, **flexible** schedules, multiple opportunities for rite of acceptance/welcoming
- Assure varied catechists and **methods/styles** of gatherings
- Assure varied **resources and availibility** to participants
- Use rituals, prayers, music
- Keep regular contact with **sponsors**, incorporate them into the process effectively
